Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award Nominations Due Feb. 25

ACCC employees are encouraged to nominate faculty for the Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award. The distinguished 40-year program is administered by the Christian R. and Mary F. Lindback Foundation, based in Philadelphia. The award carries with it a \$4,000 stipend supported by the Foundation.

Distinguished teaching is intellectually demanding and coherent. The distinguished teacher has the ability to change the way in which students view the subject they are studying. This teacher provides the basis

for students to look with critical and informed perception at the fundamentals of a discipline; he/she is accessible to students and open to new ideas and new ways of presenting those ideas.

The Lindback Award has a symbolic importance that transcends the recognition of individual merit. It should be given to advance effective teaching and serve as a reminder to the entire college community of the expectations of the College for the quality of its mission.

Keeping all of this in mind, ACCC employees are encouraged to submit a letter of nomination for someone they feel is deserving of this prestigious award.

The nominator should include a letter no more than two pages. The letter should include specific examples of teaching excellence and include:

- In what way does this faculty member go the extra mile for her/his students, preparing study materials, mentoring students, etc?
- In what way does the faculty member foster a love of learning and academic achievement in students; how does he/she communicate enthusiasm and passion for teaching and learning?
- Does this person develop innovative teaching materials?
- Does he/she use alternative and or creative teaching methods to meet the needs of students with diverse learning styles?
- How does this faculty member contribute to positive student outcomes, such as successful transitions from developmental courses; successful transfer to baccalaureate programs or entry into the workplace?

Letters of nomination should be submitted by Feb. 25. Faculty should submit their nominations to **Jim Sacchinelli**, chair of the Collegiate Assembly Executive Committee. Staff should send their nominations to the President's Office.

MIDDLE STATES MATTERS

ACCC's self study design was formally approved by Middle States Commission on Higher Education. On Nov. 30, Dr. Robert Schneider wrote, "The hard work and good discussion that produced the document are clearly evident in it...the resulting design should help you conduct a valuable self-study and a successful evaluation visit."

The hard work and good discussion continues within the subcommittees. Subcommittee six is charged with examining "Standard 8: Student Admissions" which determines whether the "institution seeks to admit students whose interests, goals, and abilities are congruent with its mission," and "Standard 9: Student Support Services" which asks if "the institution provides student support services reasonably necessary to enable each student to achieve the institution's goals for students."

Among the issues that subcommittee six will consider for standard eight are the connection between the college's mission statement and its admission criteria, how admission policies are developed and disseminated, and whether persistence and degree completion can be predicted with current admissions criteria. Some of the issues for standard nine that subcommittee six will consider are how student services contribute to student learning, the connection between support services and the college's academic mission, the effectiveness of the student advisement process, and how student grievance procedures are communicated.
