## ACCC to Offer Free Sales and Service Training

## ACCC Rotaract Club Receives Charter



Atlantic Cape Community College’s Rotaract Club received its charter from Rotary’s District Governor of Southern New Jersey, Donald Guardian, at a ceremony Jan. 31. Guardian presented the charter to **Dr. Peter L. Mora**, ACCC president. Both are members of the Atlantic City Rotary Club.

Rotaract is a branch of Rotary International designed for the young adult usually attending college. It is the fourth charter in Southern New Jersey. There are more than 8,100 Rotaract Clubs around the world. The motto for Rotary

International and Rotaract is “Service Above Self.”

Club members inducted include **Jennifer Sikora** of Dorothy, president; **Brittany Mitros** of Estell Manor, vice president; **Cristie Ricciotti** of Atlantic City, secretary; and **Helene Gillman-Hanna** of Mays Landing, treasurer. **Mike Bolicki**, assistant professor of education and psychology, is club advisor.

ACCC’s charter was co-sponsored by Rotary Clubs of Atlantic City and Ocean City/Upper Township-Evening, who provided startup funds to purchase membership materials and a Rotaract banner for the college.

Rotaract clubs are required to complete at least one local project and one international project in a year. Members are expected to follow Rotary International’s “4-Way Test.” Participation in the club enables

students to develop their leadership skills, organizational skills and develop friendships while improving their communities and the world. Students enrolled on a full- or a part-time basis may join Rotaract.

One of the goals of Rotaract is to provide an opportunity for high school students who participate in Interact, Rotary's high school level club, to continue their community service beyond the high school level. There are Interact clubs in Ocean City, Egg Harbor Township, Atlantic City, Pleasantville and Atlantic Christian high schools.

The first project of the ACCC Rotaract was the "Coats for Kids" conducted for one week in December, which resulted in 60 coats being delivered to the Atlantic City Rescue Mission. The next project under development is to collect children's books and medical supplies for refugee children in Uganda.
