#### **Paychecks, Recap Sheets Have a New Look**

Beginning with this week's paychecks (Sept. 16), your paycheck will have a new look. A new laser check will be distributed with a pressure seal. Recap forms are also laser printed for the first time this pay. A memo for the respective preparers and supervisors will be attached to the new recap form. #### **Adjunct Pay Rates Increase**

Effective fall 2005, adjunct instructor per credit compensation has increased from \$530 to \$550. Senior adjunct instructors are now earning \$580 per credit hour, up from \$560.

#### **Mileage Reimbursement Increases Effective Sept. 1**

The IRS has announced an increase to the standard business mileage rate for the final four months of 2005. The rate increases to 48.5 cents a mile for all business miles driven between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31. This is an increase of 8 cents from the 40.5 cent rate in effect for the first eight months of 2005.

## **Administrative Changes**

*As promised in the last issue of the Atlantic Cape CommuniCator, here are the bios of **Dr. Joseph Rossi** and **Bobby Royal**, new deans.*

**Dr. Joseph Rossi** was named acting dean for the Cape May County campus and labor relations on July 1. The Cold Spring resident joined the college on Sept. 17, 1984 as acting publications coordinator. He was also acting director for Information and Publications Services (now College Relations) before being named to a full-time position as internal communications coordinator on July 1, 1986.

Rossi's "acting odyssey" continued with a temporary appointment as supervisor of employment and compensation in May 1988. He then moved to acting human resources director, a title he held for more than four years.

In August 1993 Rossi was appointed director of personnel services and seven years later his role was adjusted to director of personnel and labor relations. He was assigned as acting executive director for human resources in February 2001 before being promoted to executive director for human resources and labor relations five months later.

Rossi served as interim vice president for administration and finance for one year beginning in July 2004. Most importantly, he was manager of the employee softball team for seven seasons.

He earned a bachelor's degree in journalism and a master's in organizational communication, both from the former Glassboro State College. His doctorate in educational leadership is from the University of Delaware.

Rossi's extra-curricular contributions to Atlantic Cape Community College include 16 years as student newspaper advisor, 11 years as sports information coordinator and three years as a cooperative education coordinator. He was the college's Middle States self-evaluation editor in 1995.

His teaching experience includes credit courses in news writing I and II, communications I and II, and human resources management. He also instructed freshman (retention) seminar courses as well as youth basketball and "future journalist" classes for Kids' College.

Rossi is a veteran high school basketball official and baseball/softball umpire. He's spent 30 summers operating and managing an umbrella rental business along the Cape May City beaches. He is a former national president of Alpha Phi Delta Italian-American Fraternity and chairs the statewide community college negotiators' association. He maintains a weekly sports column in the Cape May County Herald newspapers.

Prior to joining the college Rossi was a graduate assistant at the Tropicana Casino Resort human resources office and the Glassboro State College sports information department.

**Bobby Royal Sr.** was named acting dean of the Worthington Atlantic City Center and Community Affairs on July 1.

Royal joined the college on May 13, 1974 as assistant director of the Educational Opportunity Fund program. He was named EOF director two years later.

In 1982 he became coordinator for continuing education program development, an externally funded casino training initiative. Three years later he was named assistant dean of students for special programs and director of athletics. He served in this position until 1988 when he became director of admissions and

college recruitment.

The Vineland resident was promoted to executive director of admissions and college recruitment in 1997 and three years later was named executive assistant to the president.

After completing an associate's degree at ACCC, Royal earned a bachelor's degree in business from Rider and a master's in administration from Philadelphia's Antioch University. He also performed post-graduate studies at Nova University.

Royal taught ACCC business and management courses and a variety of continuing education seminars and workshops including the Sands Upward Mobility Program and Casino Management.

A former star Buccaneer basketball player, Royal coached his alma mater to a Region XIX Southern Division Championship in 1997-98 and was named Coach of the Year by the N.J. Collegiate Basketball Coaches Association.

Prior to joining the college, the Danville, Va., native was a salesman for IBM and the Phoenix Insurance Co. of Philadelphia. He served in the U.S. Air Force from 1963 to 1967 where he earned the rank of sergeant.

A multiple winner of the college's perfect attendance award, Royal has served his community in a variety of endeavors, including the Atlantic County Child Care Placement Review Board, the county's Advisory Commission on Women, the Manpower Board, Mainland Jaycees and as moderator and trustee at the Community Baptist Church.

In his new position, Royal maintains oversight of City Center operations and college-wide community affairs initiatives.

## College Presidents Sponsor Candidates' Forum with Corzine, Forrester Sept. 19; Watch the Event Live on the Web

The New Jersey Presidents' Council is sponsoring a gubernatorial candidates' forum to help New Jersey voters learn what views gubernatorial candidates U.S. Senator Jon S. Corzine and Douglas R. Forrester have on higher education and bring the issues related to higher education in New Jersey into the political

discourse.

The forum is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 19, 10 a.m.-noon at The College of New Jersey in Ewing, N.J. The forum will be moderated by Kent Manahan, senior anchor of NJN News.

## ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Congratulations to **Eric Mayo**, ACCC CE instructor, who has written and is publishing a new book, *From Jail to a Job: A Step by Step Guide*. The book, the first in a series of self-help books on getting into the labor force, will be available on Sept. 24. Mayo has been successful in helping thousands of area residents land a job and start a career. He toiled away for several years at ACCC's Worthington Center, creating minor miracles for the chronically unemployed and underemployed, women and men transitioning from welfare to work, and ex-offenders seeking re-entry to the work world.

In addition, he taught ACCC's Job Readiness Beyond Bars at the Atlantic County Justice Facility and worked with the out of school youth in the Allied Health Advancement Program. Eric is the ACCC instructor assigned to the Atlantic City Jobs and Opportunities program run by the Borgata in Atlantic City. He is already busy preparing the next two titles: *Getting Your Teenager Ready to Go to Work* and

*The Young Minority's Guide to Getting the Job You Want.*

Sunwall is professor emeritus of creative writing at the University of Florida and a critically acclaimed playwright and novelist. He was one of the judges of the competition. Griggs will fly to Florida Oct.16-18 for staged readings of the play and a visit with graduate students in theater and creative writing at the University of Florida.

The garden of **Bobby and Carmen Royal**, acting dean, Worthington AC Center and community affairs, and dean of students, respectively, was featured in the Daily Journal Garden of the Month. A book signing for award-winning author and ACCC adjunct **Carol Plum-Ucci** will be held at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 21, at Borders at the Hamilton Mall. Plum-Ucci will sign copies of her new paperback release, *The She*. She will read from the text and also from her new hardback release slated for next year, *The Night My Sister Went Missing*.

Plum-Ucci received one of the nation's top literary honors for her first novel, *The Body of Christopher Creed*, a suspense story set in the historic woods of Southern New Jersey. The novel received one of four Michael J. Printz Honor Book Awards, sponsored by the American Library Association, recognizing the best literature published for young adults in 2001. The novel also was a finalist in the 2001 Edgar Allan Poe Awards and was named to the Reader's International Children's Choice Awards List. It is a 2004 Nominee for Top 10 Most Popular Paperbacks for Young Adults, by the American Library Association.

*What Happened to Lani Garver*, was released in hardback in September 2002. This story of prejudice, friendship, popularity, tolerance and individuality raises a most important question: Might angels exist on earth? The novel has been selected as a featured book both in Seventeen Magazine (Sept. '02) and YM Magazine (Nov. '02). It is named to the 2003 Best Books for Young Adults List, sponsored by the American Library Association, and is a 2004 Teen Top 10 nominee.

*The She*, Plum-Ucci's third novel, was released in hardback in Sept. 2003. It was nominated for Best Books for Young Adults by The American Library Association and received a starred review in Booklist.

Plum-Ucci recently finished a two-year teaching fellowship at Rutgers University Camden, where she

earned her Master of Arts degree in English in 2004. She was staff writer and director of publications for the Miss America Organization. Along with many state and national honors she has received for her fiction, she has been honored with an IRIS Award from the International Association of Business Communicators for her publications and also a Dalton Penn Award. She won a Kneale Award in Journalism from her alma mater, Purdue University, for excellence in feature writing.

## **ACCC IN THE NEWS**

The opening of ACCC's Cape May County campus received lots of publicity. Coverage included several feature articles with photographs in The Press of Atlantic City and the Cape May County weekly newspapers, two Press editorials, and coverage on ABC news channel 6 and NBC news channel 40.

ACCC student **Karen Albright** of Maple Shade was named the first lieutenant in the history of the Maple Shade law enforcement Explorer's program. The program teaches teens about issues facing police officers, training cadets in morality, fingerprinting, use of force, dealing with stress, nutrition, physical fitness and baton and handcuff use.

A story on a financial review of ACCC's international program appeared in The Press.

A teacher profile on **Dr. Agnes Armao**, English professor, appeared in The Press on Sept. 4. When asked about research papers intimidating most college students, Armao explained, "You try to help them go in the direction of a topic that means something to them, so that they're anxious to look for sources."
