Atlantic County Mock Terrorism Preparation Event at ACCC a Success

On Oct. 2, Atlantic County Health Department and Office of Emergency Management, in cooperation with ACCC, Hamilton Township Police, and the American Red Cross, held a mock bio-terrorism event in ACCC's gym. The event was a test of the health department's and OEM's procedures in preparation for an actual terrorism event. The mock clinic responded to a Tularemia outbreak. The goal was to treat 300 "patients" in one hour.

With the help of 60 professional and 200 non-professional volunteers, the two county agencies assisted and dispensed medication to 305 people in one hour. The population included children and the physically disabled.

Public Health and OEM extend their appreciation to the college staff who helped with this important project, including college relations, ITS, security, business services and facilities management. Kathy

Lutz from the New Jersey State Department of Health commented on the excellent organizational and planning skills displayed by the people involved with the project.

Middle States Matters

The Middle States steering committees and subcommittees are working to implement the suggestions of Dr. Robert Schneider, our Middle States liaison. Our goal is to complete the self-study design and submit it for approval to the Middle States Commission by the end of October.

The subcommittees were asked to refine their charge questions to address some overarching themes. Each subcommittee will proceed to examine their standards, and identify the achievements, challenges and assessments related to them.

Dr. Schneider commended ACCC for undertaking the self-study process while in a period of change with the selection of a new president and the opening of the Cape May County campus. Although integral to the whole self-study, these two factors are among the focal points of the work of subcommittee 3, which is charged with addressing standards 4 and 5.

Standard 4, Leadership and Governance, states: *“The institution’s system of governance clearly defines the roles of institutional constituencies in policy development and decision-making. The governance structure includes an active governing body with sufficient autonomy to assure institutional integrity and to fulfill its responsibilities of policy and resource development, consistent with the mission of the institution.”* In considering the college leadership, subcommittee three will examine such areas as the presidential search process, how assessments of effectiveness are ensured, and how conflicts are manifested.

Standard 5, Administration, requires examination to determine that, *“The institution’s administrative structure and services facilitate learning and research/scholarship, foster quality improvement, and support the institution’s organization and governance.”* As part of the self-study process, subcommittee three will consider the effectiveness of the administrative structure and how this structure supports the governance of the college. The role of students in governance, the responsibilities of faculty and administration, and the effectiveness of written documentation are some of the other issues that will be considered by this subcommittee.
