the hub of student life and academic success at Atlantic Cape. The first floor includes meeting spaces for several student clubs including the Student Government Association (SGA), Rewrites Literary Magazine, the Atlantic Cape Review, and the Radio Club. The second floor

Meet the 2018 President's Distinguished Alumni Award Recipients!

Raymond Davis, '92

Ray graduated with high honors from Atlantic Cape Community College in 1992, earning an AS in Criminal Justice with high honors. He transferred to Stockton University to pursue a BA in Criminal Justice. He later continued his education at Fairleigh Dickinson University where he received his Master's degree.

Why I Chose to Honor My Dad with an Atlantic Cape Scholarship

Dear Fellow Alumni,

On February 13, I lost my Dad very suddenly to a stroke we didn't see coming. If you have lost a parent unexpectedly, too, then you can relate to the plethora of decisions that need to be handled all-too-quickly. Many of those decisions took much time and careful consideration for me and my sister, Diane, to handle. The one decision that came quickly to us, however, was how to honor our Dad with memorial contributions. I know many people (myself included) feel good making a donation in someone's name in lieu of flowers or food. To be fair, Diane and I agreed we should both select an organization that "feels right" to us. My family has always loved animals, and Diane wanted to recognize Cumberland County SPCA since she had adopted two rescue dogs. For my sister, the choice was easy and it was the right choice.

The same decision came quickly to me, too -- and I didn't think twice about the choice I made. I chose Atlantic Cape Community College, with plans for creating a Vassallo Family Scholarship. As uncomfortable as it sounds, I have often

shared with my husband and son that I want a scholarship named for me whenever that day comes. I wanted them to know my wishes. Although we never thought to talk about it while he was living, honoring him with a scholarship in our family name simply felt right. I know my Dad would be thrilled to know we are assisting a deserving student who starts their educational journey at a college like ours. I know how proud my Dad was of me and my successes -- years ago as a student and today as an administrator -- here at Atlantic Cape. My Dad heard me say numerous times that starting my college career at Atlantic Cape was the best decision my parents made for me.

Fellow alum, these decisions are not easy to make -- especially as you are grieving. I encourage you, however, to think about selecting Atlantic Cape like I did, knowing that your donations are going to aid one student (or more) in reaching their educational goals -- whatever they may be. Diane and I feel so good about this scholarship, and we are excited to watch it continue to increase. Although we have not determined the selection criteria, we know the Foundation team at Atlantic Cape

will work with us -- and even allow us to review student applications. We want to be an active part of the selection process. Best of all, we want to be present when our first scholarship is awarded (hopefully in 2019) and follow our recipient's successes at Atlantic Cape, as my Dad proudly followed mine.
