H1N1 and Seasonal Flu Clinics Planned

Atlantic County is organizing H1N1 and seasonal flu vaccination clinics this month, including:

- Friday, Jan. 15, 3-5 p.m., at Hammonton High School, 566 Old Forks Road.
- Thursday, Jan. 21, 3-5 p.m., at in the former Value City store at the Shore Mall, 6725 Black Horse Pike, Egg Harbor Township. Access to the clinic is from within the Shore Mall only.



The H1N1 vaccine is free and open to any New Jersey resident over 6 months. The seasonal flu vaccine is available to Atlantic County residents over age 18 for \$15 (free for Medicare Part B recipients who present their card). Children 6 months through 17 years must be accompanied by a parent or guardian (with proof of guardianship) to receive a flu shot.

The injectable vaccine is not approved for use in people with life-threatening allergies to eggs or anyone who has experienced a life-threatening allergic reaction after a dose of seasonal flu vaccine. Those who are moderately or severely ill are advised to fully recover before getting either vaccine.

ASSESSMENT TIP OF THE MONTH

Multiple learning opportunities: We all learn best with practice. So give students repeated, purposeful opportunities to learn the major concepts and skills that they will be assessed and graded on. If one of your course goals is that students develop an appreciation of other cultures, for example, include in your syllabus several assignments and class work specifically designed to help students develop this appreciation (Suskie, 2009).
